Founded in 1990, EFF protects your online privacy, security, and free expression through:

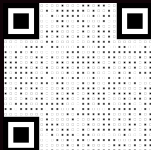
- **PUBLIC INTEREST LAW:** EFF attorneys fight for the greater good through ground-breaking court cases that support tech users' rights.

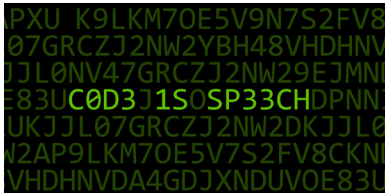

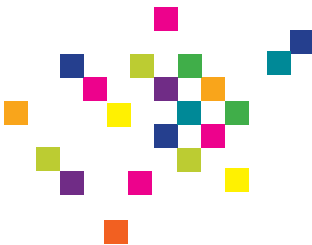

1. CODE IS SPEECH

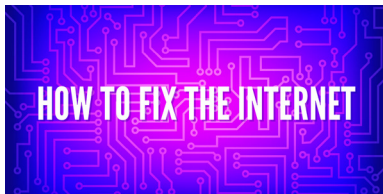
feat. Steefel, Levitt & Weiss; First Amendment Project; Hogan & Harston

EFF's second-ever case, *Bernstein v. US Department of Justice*, resulted in the first-ever court ruling that software source code was speech protected by the First Amendment. The landmark case also paved the way for encryption use around the world.



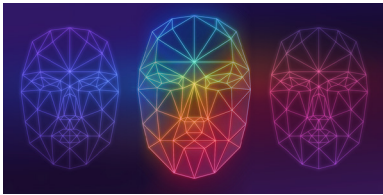
2. ILLEGAL SPYING IS ILLEGAL

For nearly two decades, EFF sued the U.S. government and telecommunications giant AT&T on behalf of its customers for collaborating with the NSA in the massive, illegal program to wiretap and data-mine Americans' communications. Testimony by whistleblower Edward Snowden provided critical evidence in support of EFF's case.



3. HOW TO FIX THE INTERNET

EFF's podcast envisions a better technological future. Through curious conversations with some of the leading minds in law and technology, we explore creative solutions to some of today's biggest tech challenges.



4. WHO HAS YOUR FACE?

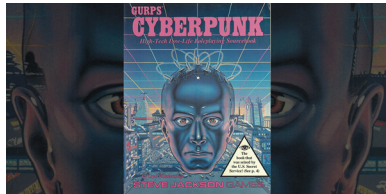
In the hands of the powerful, facial recognition technology (FRT) can be a threat to personal privacy and free expression. Through our About Face campaign and our interactive Who Has Your Face? project, we advocate for the abolition of government use of FRT and educate the public about the databases in which their images likely exist without their knowledge.



5. THE PATENT BUSTING PROJECT (SAVING PODCASTING)

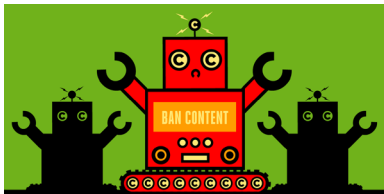
EFF fights stupid patents that suppress innovation and limit free expression. This included fighting a patent troll who sued

podcasters over a patent for “system for disseminating media content” in serialized episodes. If the troll prevailed, no one would have been able to create a podcast without paying up. EFF won, saving podcasting for everyone.



6. HIGH-TECH LOW-LIFE BEATS THE FEDS

Today it's easy to take for granted that online speech and privacy is entitled to constitutional and other legal protections. EFF's first case, Steve Jackson Games, Inc. v. United States Secret Service, vindicated internet users' online speech and privacy rights under federal law. The case also made sure law enforcement agents can't seize and hold servers with impunity.



7. BROADCAST FLAG TKO

feat. *Public Knowledge*

In another attempt to control the ways you can view media, Hollywood tried to dictate the design of any digital equipment capable of receiving broadcasts by mandating technology called a “broadcast flag.” EFF helped bring a court case that killed the broadcast flag and later took the fight to the halls of power in both in U.S. Congress and at the U.N.



8. SURVEILLANCE SELF-DEFENSE

9. CODERS' RIGHTS PROJECT

The project protects computer security research through education, amicus briefs, and pro bono legal defense. EFF is a leader in promoting innovation and safeguarding the rights of hackers and security researchers around the world.



10. HOLLYWOOD CAN'T VETO INNOVATION

EFF stood up for peer-to-peer file-sharing when the music industry tried to take it away. In a U.S. Supreme Court case, EFF defended StreamCast Networks, the company behind Morpheus.



11. ENCRYPTING THE INTERNET

feat. Mozilla Foundation, University of Michigan, Internet Security Research Group, & EFF's Certbot

Together, we ignited the “Encrypt the Web” initiative to increase your security. Today, almost all web traffic is encrypted and HTTPS is standard for major browsers, shielding you from eavesdropping, content injection, and cookie stealing while visiting websites.



12. WHO HAS YOUR BACK?/ ¿QUIÉN DEFIENDE TUS DATOS?

In 2011, EFF's first “Who Has Your Back?” report assessed whether major internet companies would commit to standing with users when the U.S. government sought

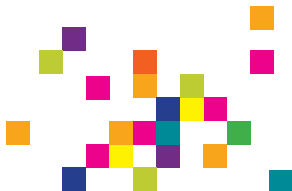
access to user data. In 2015, EFF built on this work with regional human rights groups to create similar reports for Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, and Spain.



13. SOPA/PIPA BLACKOUT

feat. Fight for the Future, Wikipedia, 115,000 websites, and millions of users

It was the most visible digital protest in internet history. A coalition of users, non-profits, and internet companies defeated the Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA) and the PROTECT IP Act (PIPA) with a 24-hour blackout drawing attention to the bills' threat of censorship. This collective action showed the world that the few major companies who control film, music, and television couldn't control the internet.





14. THE ATLAS OF SURVEILLANCE

feat. Reynolds School of Journalism at the University of Nevada, Reno

The Atlas of Surveillance maps and indexes the surveillance technologies deployed by law enforcement in communities across the United States through open source research. Compiled by more than 1,000 students and volunteers, the Atlas includes drones, body-worn cameras, automated license plate readers, facial recognition, and more.



15. INTERNET DAY OF PROTEST AND A DECLARATION OF THE INDEPENDENCE OF CYBERSPACE

feat. 5% of the entire internet, ACLU, and John Perry Barlow

In the first blackout protest, 5% of the internet (including eff.org) went dark to protest the Communications Decency Act. When the CDA passed despite the backlash, EFF cofounder John Perry Barlow declared, “We are creating a world that all may enter without privilege or prejudice accorded by race, economic power, military force, or station of birth...We will create a civilization of the Mind in Cyberspace. May it be more humane and fair than the world your governments have made before.” Not only was Barlow prophetic, the Supreme Court largely agreed in striking down the CDA and another speech-restricting law called COPA.



16. SUING DOGE TO PROTECT THE PRIVACY OF MILLIONS

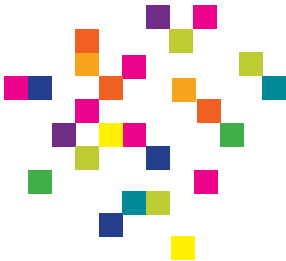

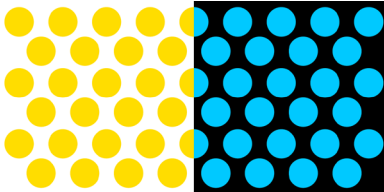
EFF and a coalition of privacy defenders filed a lawsuit and (as of this album launch) obtained a preliminary injunction that stopped the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) from disclosing millions of Americans' private, sensitive information to Elon Musk and his Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE).



17. PRIVACY BADGER

Privacy Badger is a free browser extension that stops advertisers and other third-party trackers from secretly tracking where you go and what pages you look at on the web. If an advertiser seems to be tracking you across multiple websites without your permission, Privacy Badger automatically blocks that advertiser from loading any more content in your browser.





18. YELLOW DOTS OF MYSTERY

In a purported effort to identify counterfeiters, the U.S. government persuaded color laser printer manufacturers to encode each page with identifying information, meaning that an everyday communication tool could become a tool for government surveillance. EFF raised the alarm, researching and cataloging these forms of forensic tracking technologies to educate the public.



19. SAVEDOTORG

feat. Greenpeace, Consumer Reports, Oxfam, the YMCA, and over 871 other organizations and 27,183 individuals


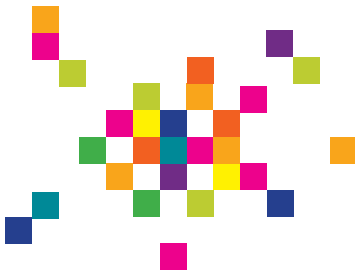
EFF and others in the NGO community sprang to action when the Internet Society announced that it had agreed to sell the Public Interest Registry—the organization that manages the .ORG top-level domain—to a private equity firm. EFF, hundreds of other nonprofits, and thousands of individuals mobilized to stop the sale and protect the sector from censorship and price gouging.



20. DANCING BABY BATTLE FOR FAIR USE

feat. the Center for Internet and Society Cyberlaw Clinic at Stanford Law School

When Hollywood sued a mom for posting a video of her baby dancing with Prince playing in the background, EFF stepped in, helping protect online speech by challenging abusive copyright claims under the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA) that led to broad censorship. This landmark case set a precedent that helps other internet users and their ISPs to fight back against improper copyright threats.
